In the last month DCP/SAFE has been able to initiate and be involved in several activities.

## SIP / Educational Goals / AdvancED Progress:

This last month the high school has been very active in the AdvancED process. We have been collecting artifacts for the first three standards. We have a phenomenal start and feel we are on the right track to completing the standards this year.

The Math Department has been working diligently to update all pacing guides. These were completed last week and are currently on the district server for the rest of the teachers to review. At this point, every grade level from K-12 has completed their pacing guides. Many of these have been added to building websites. Other departments at the high school are reviewing pacing guides to make sure they are incorporating Common Core.

The high school has been deeply involved in two assessments, PARCC and MAP. PARCC is administered for the second time to students in Algebra II and students involved in English III. The timing of PARCC and time demands of PARCC are making it very difficult to administer in the time we are allowed. We are concerned about future PARCC testing and how we will complete the assessment in a timely manner. Freshmen are involved in MAP testing and are completing the assessment as scheduled.

- Continue tapping the knowledge of the math and language arts teachers at each grade level to assist other subject areas in pedagogy
- Await the results of the 5 Essentials Survey to enable us to incorporate non-academic programs and interventions
- Identify areas that require additional staff development

We have also completed the End of Year (EOY) PARCC test at all grade levels. Hopefully we will see the results in a timely manner.

Our Character Counts group is finishing with a party and will be making their final video to be shown on our school's Facebook page and to show the Dummer students at the beginning of next year.

## Ms. Greenacre - Lynn G. Haskin

We just finished the PARCC "end of the year" assessment with our $3{ }^{\text {rd }}$ graders. Although it was a new experience for the children, they did a nice job navigating the online assessment. We hope the results are available to us sooner than in the past. One of the things that this has shown us is that we do need to investigate a keyboarding program and teaching keyboarding skills to our students! We also need to provide more opportunities for our students to experience PARCC-based online activities in both reading and math.

We will be having our final Data Day for the school year on May 26th! End of the year AIMSweb and MAP data will be analyzed. We will be looking at interventions and groups, and using this information to begin discussion and planning for next year. Our discussion will include student placement and working on the master schedule, which includes grade level intervention blocks, as well as classroom push-in time for the support teachers.

Our AdvancEd team continues to meet with the district committee to develop a plan for next year's district accreditation. The committee has been working on gathering evidence of all of the great things we are doing at the building and district levels. The district committee is still trying to determine the direction necessary to complete the district accreditation, in addition to still having to do the same requirements at the building level.

## SIP / Educational Goals / AdvancED Progress:

- AdvancED Goals:

1. To increase reading fluency.
2. To increase math fact fluency.
3. To improve students' perception that parents and families are encouraged to attend and participate in educational activities.
4. To initiate a school-wide positive behavior program.

At the most recent district-wide school improvement meeting (April 29 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ ), individual building members shared various artifacts that were collected and uploaded to the shared network drive for Standard 1: Purpose and Direction, Standard 2: Governance and Leadership, and Standard 3: Teaching and Assessing for Learning. By the end of the school year, our goal is to have additional evidence in the shared folder on Standard 4: Resources and Support Systems and Standard 5: Using Results for Continuous Improvement.

- Power Standards/Instructional Objectives/Common Assessments/Common Core Standards:

All teachers continue to build instruction around the district-identified power standards.

- Response to Intervention/Assessment:

The second phase of PARCC (EOY-End of Year) was administered to all third grade students. Spring benchmarking is in process. All K-3 students have taken the MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) or MPG (MAP for Primary Grades). AimsWeb (math and reading fluency) is currently being administered and individual classroom teachers will be giving the fourth quarter common assessments before the end of the year. One final Data Day will be held on Wednesday, May $20^{\text {th }}$.

## Academic / Extra Curricular Programs \& Services Progress:

- At an all-school assembly on April $21^{\text {st }}$, students learned that they not only met their St. Jude Math-a-Thon goal of $\$ 1500$, but more than doubled the amount raised for the St. Jude Children's Hospital by raising $\mathbf{\$ 3 1 7 8 . 4 5}$. Many students also donated the prizes they earned back to St. Jude's.
- The annual PPA-sponsored Read-a-Thon was held from April $6^{\text {th }}$ through May $1^{\text {st }}$ ending with an award ceremony at the Opera House on May $11^{\text {th }}$. Ninety-seven percent $(97 \%)$ of our students participated with ninety-four percent ( 161 of the 172 students) completing all four stations. After students received their medals, members of the Sandwich High School speech and drama club performed a couple of skits as entertainment.
- Several gallons of ice cream and lots of toppings were served at the first Prairie View Ice Cream Social and Basket Raffle. This event, held on April $30^{\text {th }}$, brought in over $\$ 3000$ to be used for items on our wish list.
- Incoming kindergarten students and their families were invited to Kindergarten Orientation on May $14^{\text {th }}$. Students and their parents learned about the activities and schedule of the kindergarten program, were introduced to the curriculum and expectations, met the teachers, and were given a tour of the building.
- Congratulations to Mrs. Jenny Clason, second grade teacher, on her successful grant writing. Mrs. Clason was awarded a $\$ 400$ literacy grant from Altrusa International of DeKalb County.
- For the second year, all PV students will be given a writing bag filled with activities, crayons, and other fun items to use over the summer. All students who bring back a completed $\log$ will be awarded a book.

April has been a busy month in Kindergarten! We are definitely showing that we are ready to move on to first grade! We are growing stronger each day in our reading as well as writing skills. In math, we have shown outstanding abilities in subtraction and addition. We had a visit from the Ladies Auxiliary of Veterans of Foreign Wars who shared information about the significance of the flag. They brought us all a flag and activity book. We also participated in a coloring contest for them and our winners were Madilyn Starsiak (K1) and Jaden Patterson(K2) who received a beautiful hardcover book.

## Mr. Marquardt - Curriculum Coordinator

We are finishing up a year of curriculum meetings concentrating on alignment to the New Illinois Standards or Common Core Standards. This has been quite an adjustment as we had been aligned to the Illinois Standards. The Common Core Standards have raised the bar as far as the level of difficulty and selection of the core standards in creating Instructional Objectives to meet our Partners 4 Results, Power Standards. In order to do this and make sense of it we have established new pacing guides in English Language Arts and Math. The pacing guides are written for each grade level and broken down into what quarter of the year various objectives are taught and assessed for. To be doing this while shifting our whole thought processes from the former ISAT test to the new PARCC test has provided us with plenty of challenges. We are finalizing the pacing guides and trying to have each grade level in a similar format to place on the District Web site.

The Language Arts committee is also deciding on some new writing instructional materials as we are preparing for the return of writing assessments which we believe will be coming as part of the PARCC assessment. We want to make sure that we are covering the same materials in all three of the elementary
buildings so we are being careful with the pacing guides by grade and the vertical articulation from grade to grade. The committee members have worked tirelessly to complete the guides in a like format. The time and energy spent by the committee members has shown the professional attitude they have toward school improvement. This has been a challenging year adjusting to the new requirements and we feel
a great deal of progress is being made. We of course are anxious as every other year to see how we did on the state assessment as well as how we compare to other schools. We are all in the same boat but we of course want to see positive results.

Our homeless student numbers have grown some this year as we had some families displaced due to fire and our numbers were up over last year. We hope the economy and housing situation stabilizes for these families and they can get back on their feet economically.

We will continue as always to watch Springfield to see what changes will be coming with a new Governor and a new State School Superintendent. Whatever happens we will have to be ready to meet the challenges and opportunities. No word on the Monsanto Grant to help with the STEM program. Continue to keep your fingers crossed.

## Mrs. Swan-Gravatt - Director of Student Services

As you know, Brecht Data Base Solutions and their "Power" products were adopted at the beginning of the school year. The Power products and exceptional customer service have exceeded our expectations.
Although the transition from our previous vendor products to Power products was not always a smooth and seamless process this past school year, it has been worth it! Going forward into next school year, our focus will be focusing on technical IEP writing skills and providing professional development in goal writing to our special education teachers and related service personnel.

Our "Hard to Test" Vision Clinic was scheduled to occur last month; however, it was cancelled due to the lack of participation from our parents to allow for the their children to be screened. Our lack of parental interest and participation in our clinic ended up being a good thing for our neighbors to the west, Somonauk Schools. Their Director of Special Education took advantage of the cancellation and was able to hold the clinic on the same day and time at the Somonauk district. Somonauk picked all costs for vision clinic. Our very cooperative relationship with Somonauk schools benefits both districts. There will be a continued effort in the forthcoming years for both districts to collaborate and share costs when possible for low incidence special education students. This kind of cooperative relationship is a "win win" for both school districts.

Our annual "Timely and Meaningful Consultation" meeting was held for the district on April $27{ }^{\text {th }}$. No parents of homeschooled students attended. All of our required paperwork has been filed and submitted to ISBE.

The district has not received our yearly "Determination" letter from the ISBE. The letter normally arrives the first week of May. I anticipate that our determination letter will report that our district "meets requirements" in regard to performance indicators. This means that we as a district are in compliance with provisions of IDEA related to provision of special education and related services.

This school year, we branched out and provided our own Adaptive PE services using one of our own PE teachers instead of the contracting with NIA for these services. It has been a huge success and I commend our own Cara Ryan for her very professional and stellar services she has provided our students this school year. All students benefit when we can use our own personnel to provide special education services rather than using an outside provider. Also, using our own school personnel results in cost savings for the district.

We finished conducting interviews for our vacant speech and language pathologist position. We are hopeful we will be able to fill this position and not have to contract with an outside provider to meet our needs.

## Mr. Bloemker - Technology Director

This past month continues to be very busy in the Technology Department. From August $11^{\text {th }}$ through February $10^{\text {th }}$, we have closed 904 documented issues or an average of 27 issues per week. As of this writing, we have 11 open items needing attention including repairs of several devices and a figuring out a couple of complicated and in-depth issues.

PARCC Testing: The EOY PARCC testing has begun\& is scheduled to be completed by May $22^{\text {nd }}$. This testing will be administered the same way using the computers for online testing. We don't expect as many 'bumps' this time since we now have some experience under our belts. However, as luck has it, there is always new \& exciting hurdle that need to be jumped. Issues are being dealt with as they come up \& testing moves forward.

ERATE: Update - All USAC forms 471 were filed before the deadline. There are certain projects that simply are not covered under the ERATE program any longer \& a new phone system and the fiber optic replacement are two of them. So unless grant monies are obtained which is highly unlikely to be available, the district is going to have to shoulder that financial burden. The form 471 's that were filed was for the district wireless and infrastructure equipment upgrades. Those forms have not yet been approved by USAC as their status is 'Initial Review' meaning the USAC reviewers are going through the applications to ensure correctness \& validity. If the projects are approved, then it will be up to the Board of Education whether to move forward with the project or not as the district will need to shoulder $40 \%$ of the cost \& USAC will reimburse the other $60 \%$.

So why would the district need the 2 projects no longer funded or reimbursed by ERATE? 1) The current district Nortel phone system is over 15 years old \& replacement parts are getting hard to locate. The voicemail part of the current phone system is no longer compatible with most cellular providers causing parental frustration when they try to leave messages about their children. 2) The fiber optic replacement for the campus schools has been in the ground for over 15 years and cannot be upgraded to any faster link speeds. It is currently max'd out at $1-\mathrm{Gbps}$ using multi-mode fiber optic cable. In order to provide additional speeds, this cable must be replaced with single-mode fiber optic cable. I have received an estimate of $\$ 85,000$ and I am currently seeking 2 budget pricing quotes from Frontier and DeKalb Fiber Optics
(DFO). I hope to receive them soon.
Registration: The new Tyler Online Registration module continues to be very successful for parents. There are still a lot of parents who have not registered their children for the next school year. Buildings are planning to use the School-Reach alert system to make calls reminding parents to complete this task as soon as possible.

Summer Plans: Summer help will be notified soon and they will be starting June $1^{\text {st }}$ to begin the cleaning process. I will soon be preparing for the purchase of 3 new servers to replace the District's 3 main servers. I will also gathering pricing for needed supplies and other equipment to complete summer projects.

Some tasks being completed in the near future are completing the filing of ERate form 471 - category 2 projects, planning for summer projects and keeping the district operating at full capacity.
